Aims and Scope

The journal addresses specialist lawyers in private practice and inhouse with a focus on international patent litigation. The journal provides comments and insights concerning decisions of the Unified Patent Court and the UPC agreement. However, it will also treat litigation in the national European courts with a cross-border impact.

The journal focusses on giving practical and timely advice to everyone who deals with patent litigation in the national courts and in the UPC. The editors expect, of course, that quotations are properly marked and that important parts of annotations to decisions and articles are well researched.

The journal aims to provide a comprehensive overview not only of the developments in large litigation hotspots but also in other members states of the EPC and the UPC agreement. To this end, the journal has an editorial board with members from Germany, France, Italy and the Netherlands as well as an advisory board with members from the vast majority of other UPC member states.

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Manuscript Details

1. Length

- Articles: 24,000 - 48,000 characters (including spaces)
- Case Notes and Reports: 9,000 - 18,000 characters (including spaces)
- Editorial: 6,000 - 8,000 characters (including spaces)

2. Title and Author

The first page of the contribution should include:

- a concise and informative title of the contribution
- Asterisk footnote: Authors name, title and affiliations
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3. Abstract

Please provide a short abstract, between 150 and 250 words.

4. Articles and Annotations in Detail

References	References should not be cited in the text but in footnotes.
