Rules for submitting materials for publication

- The editorial office would like to announce that royalties are not paid to authors for the publication of articles in "Court Review".
- The editorial office would like to ask authors to send their materials for publication by e-mail to pl.PrzegladSadowy@wolterskluwer.com.
- Articles should be no longer than 22 standard computer pages (a maximum of 40,000 characters with spaces and footnotes), while commentaries should be approx. 11 standard computer pages (20,000 characters with spaces and footnotes). Longer materials will not be accepted for publication or the editorial office will return them to the authors with a request to shorten them.
- Authors are asked to attach the following to the article that they submit: a) a translation of the title of the article into English, b) keywords in Polish and in English, c) an abstract in Polish and in English, each of a length of approx. 1000 characters with spaces (approx. 1/2 a standard computer page), d) a bibliography as an attachment and e) the ORCID number.
- The editorial office reserves the right to shorten the article, make stylistic, linguistic and grammatical corrections, as well as introduce subheadings.
- When submitting the materials, authors are asked to provide a) their e-mail address and b) their contact telephone numbers, as well as c) their residential address and d) academic title, position held or function performed. If the materials are accepted for publication, the authors will be asked to provide their personal details, which are required for the tax return.
- Articles included in "Court Review" will be reviewed,
- Materials intended for publication in "Court Review" must not have been published anywhere previously or reviewed for publication in any other magazine.
- When providing the article to the editorial office, the author shall also transfer the exclusive right to publish it (copyright and publishing right) to the publisher.
- The editorial office would like to explain that ghostwriting and guest authorship are signs of academic misconduct all cases discovered will be documented and the appropriate entities (institutions employing authors, academic societies, associations of academic editors, etc.) will be notified. Ghostwriting describes the situation when someone has made a significant contribution to the publication, whereas his involvement has not been disclosed as one of the authors or his role is not mentioned in the acknowledgments of the publication. Guest authorship involves the situation in which the author's involvement is negligible or non-existent, but even so, he is the author or co-author of the publication.
